Most people are experts at talking but often we shy away from having meaningful and constructive conversations about things we find difficult to talk about. We don't always manage to get it right when we need to have a direct and challenging conversation with someone about their performance or conduct. This can be particularly difficult when we work with volunteers who give generously of their skills and time and effort.

This half-day workshop will provide a greater understanding of when and how to talk to people on confronting topics, or when conflict is present.

Volunteers and the 1918 flu epidemic

Most of us know about the 1918 flu epidemic which spread like a plague throughout New Zealand as World War I ended. But few know about the extraordinary work done by volunteers during this terrible time.

Exactly 100 later Volunteer Wellington has launched an impressive publication called Wellington volunteers and the 1918 flu epidemic, to remember the brave teams of volunteers who responded to the call for help.

Appropriately held in the War Memorial Museum café during November - when the epidemic was at its worst in Wellington - the launch, with quest speakers Professor Geoffrey Rice, Emeritus Professor of History at University of Canterbury and Mayor Justin Lester, was a celebration of both the current team of volunteers who

master-minded the research, writing and printing of the book; and a salutary reminder of the volunteers who nursed, fed, supported the families of the dying and ill ... and many of whom died themselves.

Ann Hodson, who sparked

the idea of the publication and was also involved with the Karori Cemetary 1918 influenza epidemic project, says in her reflection in Wellington volunteers: 'I tried to imagine how it must have been for volunteers in Wellington during those challenging, devastating and heart-breaking weeks that the influenza epidemic raged.'

How different the experience was, she said, for the team of volunteers working in the Karori cemetery. And yet how much has not changed. 'A

unique link between the events of 1918 and 2018 has been the glimpses of the impact of volunteering. It has been a reminder that 'volunteering is lifechanging'.

The book production volunteer team, Brendan Sweeney, Lynne White, Ann Hodson, Ida Bagus, Aditya Manuaba, Julie O'Brien, Sharon Kirk, Alex Birch, Hilary Stace, Max Kerr and Sue Hobbs, who worked under the leadership of Volunteer Wellington's manager programmes Aileen Davidson, experienced similar outcomes as their work progressed.

All were thanked and applauded at the book launch.
